

## **Gift Aid**

This year, from January to September, we have received £6,147.52 in recovered tax.

Anyone who is a taxpayer and has not applied for Gift Aid, see me on a Sunday. All you have to do is sign a declaration form – that's it – no information needed about your finances or personal details.

Under Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme, charities can claim on donations up to £20. This means that for members who are not taxpayers, their offerings and donations can be included in claims to HMRC without having to complete a declaration form. This will cover offerings, open plate, small donations and giving day.

If you have a change of circumstances i.e. change of address / name / no longer a taxpayer, please let me know – keeps my records up to date.



## Minister's Message



“Every November I try to make a space in my diary to attend the Willow Creek World Leadership Summit. This year, as last, it is in Stirling. I did have the privilege of attending the real thing in 2014 in Chicago and it is a very impressive gathering. The number of people there is like a small town (something near 12, 000 people) and the atmosphere is amazing. We are reminded each year of the many clergy who can't attend such an event because of personal financial circumstances, difficulty in travel, and war. And yet, even in these troubled situations stories are told of the church doing great things and the mission of the church being furthered. We hear about churches that are growing in spite of the horrendous conditions they have to endure.

By the time you read this, America will have voted in their next President. I can't remember a campaign that has been as vicious and nasty as this one. Neither person seems to have come out of it with any real glory. Even here in the UK, with all the Brexit machinations, some politicians seem happy with stirring the pot and even adding to the nastiness of what was a very low level standard of debate. All the while, it adds to the uncertainty in the world today, adding to people's worry about the future. And yet, going on in the background, is good work. Often unnoticed, often unrecognised and un-thanked, good things are still happening. The work of Cross Reach for example. The caring arm of the Kirk, looking out for the vulnerable in society, helping those who are struggling. The work of the Food Bank, to which you give so generously, for which I thank you, is helping people make ends meet. The service of ordinary members of the Kirk who are quietly getting on serving Christ in the clubs and associations that need their support. At the core of this is the mission of the Church, to serve Christ and also to tell people about the good news that is the Gospel, that people would learn about Jesus because of what we do in His service. This is mission.

I was challenged by several of the speakers at the conference and I began to think about what the church is doing in mission, or whether the church nationally is simply maintaining itself and even just managing its own decline. It was hard to listen to these people talking of the church that I hold dear, realising that they might be right. Perhaps we need to realign our thinking to be more missional in outlook. Our Outreach Committee serves us well by reminding us, educating us even, of groups that seek to be advocates to the voiceless, assistants where people need some physical help, companions where loneliness looms, and they do this locally, nationally and internationally.

We also need to look at what motivates our spirituality. Are we taking opportunities to charge our spiritual batteries on a daily basis? Are we making sure that we have a few moments each day with our God? Are we expecting our God to show up and answer our prayers? The people in countries where there is conflict and struggle are certainly doing this. Are we in danger of becoming complacent in our walk of faith? These were all questions that challenged me at the conference. Do they offer a similar challenge to you?

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## **POSITIVE NEWS FROM THE TREASURER!!!!**

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I thought I'd better start with an eye-catching headline, just to emphasise the positive nature of the Treasurer's report. I'm led to believe there are a few readers who skip over this section for fear of seeing further bad news, or perhaps because it's not very interesting.

Well, this Treasurer's Report will be different (although perhaps it still won't be very interesting!)

Rarely have I had the opportunity to be so positive about the finances of our church, so please forgive my over-enthusiasm. I may have got somewhat carried away!!

Firstly, from a financial perspective, it has been confirmed that we have had significant assistance from a combination of presbytery and "head office". They have reduced the level of contribution towards Ministry & Mission that we are to pay this year by some £12,000 Not only that, but they have also written off our shortfall from past years, which stood at £16,814

In other words, we have effectively been given almost £29,000 to help us along. I think you'll agree this is a phenomenal sum, and one which makes my job significantly easier. This financial assistance may be due to the many letters of appeal we have made over past years, when we disputed the levels of income that were shown on our annual statements (these wrongly included money granted to us so we could upgrade our heating) but regardless, the amount we have been given is way beyond my expectations, and I am immensely grateful to both presbytery and George Street for this.

I'd like to think also, that the assistance offered reflects the attitude we have shown, as a congregation, to struggle on through financial adversity, being as positive as we can, raising what funds we can, and making ends meet as much as possible. Our recent fundraising efforts have been a shot in the arm to the church, not only financially, but also to the levels of fellowship we enjoy, and our engagement with the general public. I can't imagine this has gone un-noticed, and I suspect that this will have been viewed very positively.

All I can say further is – let's keep it going. Let's finish 2016 on a high, and continue it on to 2017. Also, if you have any questions about any aspect of the church finances, please feel free to ask.

### Rewiring

The rewiring work has begun and much progress has been made, despite the presence of some difficult obstacles to overcome. Our previous wiring had pretty much disintegrated in places, and this and the fact the there is virtually zero clearance for underground work have added to the complexities of the job to be done. Our contractor has had his hands full, but has been very inventive in finding solutions.

Despite all the financial assistance noted above (the £29000 from Presbytery and George Street), we will still be able to draw on a grant of £10,000 from the trustees at George Street, towards the cost of the rewiring, once we have been invoiced for the work done. This will make the final bill much smaller and easier to manage, and I will keep you all posted as best I can.

### Get Wired In

Our fundraising campaign will have been running for a good few months by the time you read this, indeed the rewiring may have been completed and paid for. While this would mean we have to decide on a new purpose for our fundraising efforts, and perhaps a new name, can I urge everybody to continue as this year comes to a close, and a new one begins. Maintaining the levels of enthusiasm and commitment during the fundraising effort, in both planning and execution, will be a big challenge, but our response this year proves what levels we can reach, and that warm glow of achievement and increased levels of friendship and fellowship are not the only rewards we can attain.

The totals raised in the events so far are as follows :

Children's Day drop-in cafe	£261.20
Wimbledon-themed lunch	£649.22
Talbot House Coffee Morning	£487.90

These are fantastic amounts raised, and I would like to thank all who contributed their time or talent to help our cause.

### Other fundraising

A further fundraising idea which we have adopted is the use of a website called Easy Fundraising. Basically, by shopping on the internet, exactly as you would normally, but instead navigating via a website associated with Kirk of the Holy Rood, you will raise additional funds for the church at no cost to yourselves, or indeed to the church. Just by shopping via this website means that commission is paid on your purchases, so please consider this is as a further help to our funds.

## **National Youth Assembly**

I recently had the privilege of attending my first ever National Youth Assembly along with Hazel Smith. I was made to feel very welcome and I really enjoyed making new friends from across Scotland. I could tell that a lot of loving effort had gone in to making our jam-packed weekend the best it possibly could be.

As well as being a fun weekend of fellowship, NYA provided me with an interesting insight into what the church is discussing and campaigning for at a local and national level. It was encouraging to see so many young people passionate about sharing the love of God with others through advocating Gender Justice, Mental Health awareness, and developing fresh expressions of ministry and how we 'do' church. As some of you may have heard during our "NYA report", here are the main conclusions which came from our discussions:

- Gender Justice: We can try to reverse the negative effects of gender stereotypes by valuing and including people as best we can, no matter their gender identity.
- Mental Health: We can recognise the stigma often suffered by people with mental health issues, and play our part to offer love and support to people who may be affected, both inside and outside of church.
- Fresh Expressions: We can make an effort to reach out to people in new ways, trusting that God will open up doors for us as we serve Him.

I believe that each of us can make a difference in these areas by choosing to be intentional about loving the people around us as best we can. I don't know what that might look like for you, perhaps it just consists of inviting someone to your house for coffee, calling a friend for a chat, signing up for duty at church or donating items to the local food bank. Personally, I am challenging myself to actively look for opportunities to give and serve as I settle in to a new community abroad. May we be inclusive and welcoming, recognising that there is room for everyone at God's table. We are blessed to be a blessing!
